Good Afternoon Distinguished Guests, the families of our graduands and most importantly to our graduands themselves, Sarah Redfern High Schools Graduating Year 12.

It is timely on special occasions as this when we are faced with so many possibilities that exist in the future for these young people that we also take some time to think about the past. More specifically the year 2013. Two significant events happened that year. Firstly, our current year 12 students started as fresh faced year 7s, filled with nerves, anxiety, excitement and anticipation. I'm certain those days were filled with concern by your parents and families as well. Now when I look across at this group of young adults, I see confidence, self-assuredness, capability and potential. A cohort that has achieved a great milestone in graduating today. Rather than symbolising the end of a journey, in reality your lives are just beginning.

Conversely, the other significant event I mentioned earlier that also occurred in 2013, on the 5th December to be precise, was the passing of Nelson Mandela. Nelson Mandela is remembered as a truly great 'statesmen', living a life of adversity with grace and dignity. His sacrifices bought about great changes for many South African people for many generations to come. ATAR Advice from UAC

Remember to download and print your ATAR Advice Notices when ATARs are released in December. You only have free access until February to do this. After that you will be charged for a digital or printed copy.

Course Offer Rounds for Year 12s

The most important offer rounds for Year 12 students are December Round 2 (Thursday 20 December 2018) and January Round 1 (Friday 11 January 2019).

Not all courses will be offered in December Round 2, and applicants should check UAC's website for details of excluded courses before they finalise their course preferences.

Students whose results are not available in time for December Round 2 can be assured that they will not be disadvantaged. Universities will still have places available to make offers to all courses in January.

Early Bird Applications are Closing

28 September

The processing charge you pay for applying for university through UAC depends on when you apply. The early bird charge of \$70 ends at midnight on Friday 28 September so remember to apply by then. After this date the fee reverts to the standard processing charge of \$200.

Advice: Even if you are not sure of your courses by this date, apply by 28 September and then change your course preferences after this date as many times as you wish – for free!

Schools Recommendation Schemes (SRS) Applications are Closing

Applications for the Schools Recommendation Schemes (SRS) close at midnight on 28 September, so don't forget to get your form back to the school well before this date!

UAC PINS:

All 2018 NSW HSC and ACT Year 12 applicants had their UAC PIN emailed to them in early August at the email

address they registered with NESA. We will be sending a PIN reminder email on Monday 24 September to students who have not yet applied through UAC. If you didn't receive your PIN email, look for this email from UAC. If your PIN doesn't work, you need to double-**check you're using the UAC PIN and not the PIN** issued by NESA.

If you have lost or forgotten your PIN after you applied, you can click the 'Forgotten your PIN' link under 'Manage your application'.

If you haven't yet applied, you should call UAC. You will

need to answer some identification questions and then your UAC PIN will be re-issued.

Earlier this term, we were proud to greet the mass amounts of people who were waiting for their food on 3 August. After the hordes of students rushed to get their food, a sigh of relief was made when the school bells rang and we moved on to counting our profits. As soon as we finished the fundraising, we cleaned and counted the money in anticipation hearing in the results from the day.

We are delighted to say that 12WS2 managed to hit our goal (\$1200); enough to update one of the courts – just in time for our HSC exams! It has been so rewarding to follow through with our project, from initial brainstorming right through to ordering the plaque that will be mounted on the boards as a reminder of our contribution to the school community and a legacy of our learning.

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TERM 3 CONCEPT 'FORECASTS' GATHERING DATA – 8 PURPLE MATHEMATICS

In order to collect data, 8 purple students were required to use chopsticks. This meant that for many students, they were learning to use them for the first time.

Firstly, students watched <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=VwIMYekv56s</u> that assisted students in constructing a box from an A4 sheet of paper. This was used to contain seeds.

Secondly, students collected seeds from their paper box and dropped into a paper cup pre practise. After this, the class were provided 5 minutes to practise manipulating their chopsticks. Finally, students were timed for 30 seconds as they picked a seed from one box and dropped it into the other- post practise.

Students recorded the number of seeds they had collected. Their pre and post practise data was presented on the board and as a class we were able to analyse this data and calculate the mean, median, mode and range.

This term, a small group of Year 11 students, Tileigha, Nicole, Tyrone and Braiden attended the Western Sydney University's Pathway to Dreaming 'Visions for the Future' day at the Parramatta campus. After an hour travelling by bus we were provided a tour of the campus by current university students. They informed us that the land that the university now sits on, was previously a home for poor and destitute girls. We visited the boiler house that once provided heating to the orphanage, which has been renovated to a modern restaurant. The female orphanage house has been converted to lecture rooms and the Badanami Centre for Indigenous Education that provides a culturally appropriate learning environment that caters to the needs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students studying at the campus.

The guest speaker, Federal Agent Daniel Mills from the Australian Federal Police shared his journey as a young Aboriginal man who was an inspiration to the year 11 students. Students were able to learn first-hand that the AFP offers entry level placements.



The team challenge required groups of students to design and construct from the materials supplied, a model that represents 'visions of the future'. Teams were required to present and were assessed on originality, visual appeal and the extent that the design was linked to the concept of 'visions of the future'. Rest assured, we have critical thinkers at SRHS who demonstrated their capacity to work under pressure and within the time frame of 30 minutes. Well done to our Year 11 students.

Please help us supply appropriate bus services by reminding students to tap on and tap off with their School Opal cards.

I am writing on behalf of Interline, the bus operator that provides your school bus services, regarding student use of the School Opal card.

One of the more significant changes created by the recent introduction of the School Opal card is the need for students to tap on and off when they travel to and from school. Opal data gathered by tapping on and off is used to determine demand for bus services. If students don't tap on and tap off, services may be cancelled due the lack of recorded patronage. With this in mind, we ask for your assistance in reminding your students that tapping on and off at the beginning and end of each trip is one of the conditions of using a School Opal card.
